Instagram - New Parental Controls

Instagram have launched some new features which I'm sure many parents will welcome. These new features include:

- The ability to see how time their child spends on Instagram.
- Awareness of who their child is following and who is following their child.
- Notification if/when their child reports someone and the type of report that was made.

The ability to set specific times when parents can limit their child's screen time.



Filtering systems in use at Oakway

At Oakway Academy we use Smoothwall filtering on all of our hardware as part of our obligations outlined in the document 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'.

We use this tool so that appropriate filters and monitoring systems are in place to ensure that children should not be able to access harmful or inappropriate material from the school system.

All internet searches undertaken by pupils are monitored on a real time basis which allows us to view a screenshot of a child should an inappropriate google search be made.

Please be assured that any instances are taken extremely seriously with the Welfare team speaking to any pupils.
