

Staying Safe Online

Advice to share with your child

Never post or trade personal pictures

You don't know where they might end up or with who

Never reveal personal information

Including address, phone number, school name or location

Use a screen name

Instead of your real name when possible

Never share your password

Except with your parents/carers

Never agree to meet in person with anyone you met online

Without parental approval or supervision

Use different passwords for different applications

This way if one password is hacked, the rest of your accounts are still safe

Roblox

Roblox is one of the most popular video games on the market. It has a PEGI rating of 7+, which gives a false sense of safety to parents/carers about their children using it.



What are the risks?

Contact with strangers Roblox encourages users to communicate online. This can expose children to risks like scammers, predators, harassment and more. There is a filter used in the chat but it does not prevent all harmful messages from passing through.

Public servers

The game has private servers that allow players to only play with friends but this costs money. The alternative is to play on a public server where players might interact with anyone.

Online daters

Some of the game players intentionally join Roblox to find someone to date and then meet in real life. This is against Roblox community guidelines but does not stop online daters. There are some player-built Roblox game worlds that are specifically designed for online dating.

In-app purchases

Even though the app is free to download, there are some hidden costs where players are encouraged to make purchases in the game. Social Media Some risks children might face on a social media platform

Inaccurate or false information and extreme views

Promotion of harmful behaviours

Including self-harm, eating disorders and suicide

Oversharing of personal information

Getting involved in bullying or hurtful behaviour

This could be deliberate or unintentional

Seeing or sharing of inappropriate content

Including sexual, pornographic or violent content

Meeting people posing behind fake profiles

This could be for the purpose of sexual grooming, stalking, blackmail or identity theft and hacking among others

Wizz

Wizz is a new social media app that is becoming popular with teens. It aims to connect strangers with common interests together so they can chat and exchange pictures and videos. The age rating for the app is 16+ but the content and language used in the chats should make it 18+. It is also quite easy for a younger child to bypass the age verification system and use the app when under 16.



Connecting with strangers

The aim of the app is to connect people with similar interests who might not have a chance to know each other in real life. This means that your child will be communicating with strangers. While some of this interaction could be to start a genuine friendship, in some cases it will be an attempt to manipulate them into doing or giving something that the stranger wants or to harm the child in some way. Contact with strangers can also lead to exposure to content or conversations that are not age appropriate for a child. This can lead to a child feeling worried, upset or confused.

Inappropriate content

Even though the app's guidelines prohibit sexual or violent content, some questionable topics can slip into the chats.

Age verification

The app's age verification system consists of checking your entered date of birth against a picture of your face, which is easy to bypass meaning that minors can find themselves mingling with adults but thinking they were with other similarly-aged teens.

Parental Control Explained

What is it?

Software designed to protect minors from age-inappropriate content

Available features

Block inappropriate website content Create a whitelist of allowed websites Create a blacklist of blocked websites Limit amount of time children spend at a digital device

App blocking

This is another feature that allows parents to block specific programs regardless of time of day or usage

Invisible installation

A feature that allows parents to install the parental control app completely invisibly on a device. This means that tech-savvy teenagers will not be able to remove it or get around the filtering

Flare Report App

A new free smartphone app has been released that can help women and girls feel and be safer on the streets of Northamptonshire. It allows women to report, anonymously and quickly, any incidents or behaviour that makes them feel unsafe when they are out and about. Police will collate and analyse the reports made, so that problem areas can be identified and action taken.

Qustodio Parental Control App

Qustodio is a parental control app used for monitoring phones, tablets and computers. It has to be downloaded on the parent's as well as the child's devices. The app is available for free but certain features are available only through in-app purchases. The free version allows parents to monitor only 1 child device.

Reviews of the app are quite positive as it allows you to see a summary of all of the activity of the child's mobile usage, as well as break that down by type of activity. Qustodio also allows parents to set screen time limits and stop access to inappropriate content on any browser the child uses.
